Our program for 2024 features activities across *Lutruwita*, including from *Pataway*/Burnie and *Limilinaturi*/Devonport in the north, to *Larapuna*/Bay of Fires and *Trayapana*/Triabunna on the east coast, to *Nipaluna*/Hobart and *Taluna*/the Huon River in the south. Exciting activities for all ages encompass science from the *wurangkili/sky* to the *muka/sea* and from *lutha/gumtrees* to *patrula/fire* to *truwala/mountains* (italicised words are in palawa kani, the language of Tasmanian Aborigines). I hope to see you there!
